Our Purpose

In 2018, the County Parks Department continued to play an important role in the quality of life for Portage County residents. Parks are important for health physical fitness, economic development, tourism, and conservation.

Researchers have found that parks, recreation, and open space amenities are ranked as one of the most important quality of life factors that people have identified. These areas have always been highly demanded by the citizens of Portage County.

Quality of life is an important determining factor for recruiting new businesses, business expansion, and retaining employees. Businesses often select a location with a high quality of life, including parks, open space, and easy access to the outdoors in order to compete for the highly trained in-demand workers.

In addition, retirees are choosing communities to settle in that have high quality of life factors. Overall, communities that do not factor in the quality of life issues will lose out to ones that do.

Often over looked is the value County Parks provide for tourism. Previous camping surveys show that campers spent over \$650,000/year in Portage County while on their camping trips. This spending is significantly higher when other park users such as boaters, fisherman, skiers, bikers, lodge renters, Green Circle Trail users, snowmobilers, and tournament participants such as (Disc Golf) are considered.

The Parks Department is staffed by 10 full time employees. In addition, 23 seasonal employees help make everything possible.

The Portage County Board of Supervisors established the Park Commission in 1935. The seven member Park Commission consists of four County Board Supervisors, whose term is subject to re-election every two years and three citizen members who serve seven year terms.

The achievements of the Portage County Parks Department would not be possible without the support of our staff, Park Commission, elected officials, and the local community.

Other Projects

Green Circle Trail- Portage County does all the routine maintenance, storm damage clean up and enforcement on the 27 mile trail except in the City Parks and Schmeckle Reserve. Approximately 126,000 use the trail system annually.

Snowmobile Trail Program – Portage County currently contracts with ten snowmobile clubs for trail maintenance. The Governor’s snowmobile council approved funding for \$87,270 for the maintenance of 290.9 miles of trail for the 2018 season.

Cross Country ski trail grooming – The Parks Department grooms approximately ten miles of ski trails at Standing Rocks. In addition, the department continues to manage, maintain, and groom the Plover River ski trail at the city well fields.

Land Preservation Fund Committee (LPFC) – A Park Commission representative as well as The Parks Director are members of the LPFC that was created in 2004 for the purpose of protecting open spaces and outstanding natural features in Portage County.

County Department Cooperation

The Parks department works with the Facilities Department to continue to share manpower and equipment for projects when needed. Lends equipment for use to remove excess of snow in parking lots. We also do their tree injections for Emerald Ash borer. Facilities provides an electrician for Parks projects.

The Parks Department mows grass, sprays weeds, cuts dead trees, and plows snow at the Sheriff’s Department law enforcement range.

New Projects created during the year.

Parks Department created a new one mile lighted x/c ski loop at Standing Rocks Park. 50% funded through Trails Aids Grant.

Annual Report Highlights

Camping – The \$237,560.00 from camping revenues was an increase of 3 percent over 2017. Approximately 33,078 people camped at the county parks in 2018.

Firewood Sales -Totalled \$16,040. This tied last years' record.

Lodge Rentals. The \$23,702 from lodge rentals were ½% higher than 2017.

Skiing – The downhill opened for its 52nd year and was open for 26 days plus 9 special events for a total of 35 days. A total of 689 X/C skiers, 1310 downhill skiers, and 1300 others from special events used the hill. Revenues totaled \$31,301.00 this was down 12.6% over 2017.

Other Standing Rocks Park Revenues – In addition to winter recreation revenues and Lodge rentals, the park provides a number of other activities where user fees were generated; Disc Golf, Dog Exercise and mountain biking. In 2018 the Disc Golf course generated \$ 9,258.00. Dog Park generated \$10,858.00, and Mt. Bike \$4,170.00

Cross Country Course – The running course created at Standing Rocks Park in 2011 continues to be popular. Close to 80 high schools and middle schools with approximately 1500 students participated in the cross country meets Approximately 2000 spectators attended the school events.

Boat launch Permit Fee – 2016 was the first year for boat launch fees. In 2018 the Parks Department generated \$20,405.00 which was up from 2017 numbers of \$19,990.00.

Jordan Nature Center – The nature center is staffed by 7 volunteers for 15 Saturdays, for a total of 159 hours. 380 people attended the center. Parks staff and other volunteers continue sporadic programming when requested and some campground programs are still conducted when time allows.

Dewey Shooting Range – The range completed its 32nd season. A total of 1683 shooters used the range during the year. Range numbers have averaged 1847 for the past five years. In addition the sheriff's department and hunter safety classes used the range and adjacent law enforcement range. The total range revenue was \$ 11,018.00 on par with our 5 year average of \$11,031.00

Re-pave Collins Campground Road. Due to deteriorating conditions.
