

Portage County Sheriff's Department

Operations Division

Patrol

The Portage County Sheriff's Department Patrol consists of 20 Patrol Deputies, 6 Patrol Supervisors, and 2 Shift Commanders. These deputies provide patrol services 24 hours a day, 365 days a year. These services include coverage of approximately 810 square miles including coverage of interstate, state, county and town roads. The Patrol section provides full time law enforcement services for all townships, villages and unincorporated villages that do not have a law enforcement agency and assist the two agencies that do provide full time coverage. In Portage County only the City of Stevens Point and the Village of Plover have full time law enforcement coverage. Portage County consists of 17 townships, 9 villages and 10 unincorporated villages. The population of the county, excluding Stevens Point and Plover, is approximately 32,000.

The Sheriff's Department is responsible for enforcing state and local laws, and all motor vehicle laws. They respond to and investigate motor vehicle crashes, all criminal activity reported or observed - including but not limited to domestic violence, disturbance, death, burglary, theft, damage to property, weapons, sexual assault, other assaults, fire, mental illness, missing/runaway persons, motor vehicle theft, narcotics, rescue, robbery, suspicious person/vehicle/circumstances, trespassing, wanted person, 911 calls and alarms.

There will be situations which require specialized training to address the more serious situations that law enforcement deals with without posing a greater danger to the public or the officers. This is when the Special Response Team (SRT) and Hostage Negotiation Team are called in. SRT personnel are members of the Sheriff's Department who have been specially trained and equipped to deal with hostage situations, barricaded subjects, persons who are heavily armed or suspected of being heavily armed and drug warrants.

In addition to the regular duties in the deputies' job description they are also involved in other duties requiring specialized training as mentioned above. These include:

Court Security

In 2007, the Sheriff's Department started the Court Services Unit, which consists of two deputies that are assigned to the second floor of Court House. Their duties include court security and transporting inmates to and from the jail for court appearances.

Civil Process/Inmate Transport

Two deputies are assigned to the duties of civil process and transports. These Deputies are responsible for providing transport of people in our custody to different facilities throughout the State of Wisconsin. Deputies traveled 72,480 miles in 2007, logging 1700 hours transporting time.

These deputies are also responsible for serving civil process. In 2007, a total of 1232 Civil Process papers were served. Another 1262 attempts were made.

Detective Bureau

The Detective Bureau consists of five Investigators plus one Drug Investigator. The Detective Bureau is charged with the investigations of crimes and other matters that happen within Portage County. The Bureau will, at times, work in a joint effort with other local, state, or federal agencies when a suspect is from another area in the state or located outside the State of Wisconsin. The Detective Bureau handles burglaries, thefts, computer related crimes, child welfare cases, death investigations, homicides, suicides and other incidents that require further investigation. The Detective Bureau also responds to and assists in auto accidents involving fatalities where charges may be filed.

Administrative Section

The Administrative section consists of one Administrative Lieutenant, one Property Sergeant, one Court Officer and two Court Security Officers. The Administrative Lieutenant is also responsible for overseeing the Detective Bureau and the Communications Center.

Portage County Sheriff's Department Communications Center

Level of Service

The Portage County Sheriff's Department Communications Center, commonly referred to as the Dispatch Center, provides a vast array of services to a number of agencies and the citizens of Portage County. Two Lead Dispatch Supervisors and eight Dispatchers make up the hub of the communication services provided by the Portage County Sheriff's Department Communications Center. The Dispatch Center is controlled by as many as three dispatchers during historically busy time periods of the day, and by as few as one dispatcher during periods of less activity during the early morning hours. The center is manned twenty-four hours a day. Above and beyond the daily duties related to the Portage County Sheriff's Department, the dispatch center provides dispatching and paging duties for the following:

6. 15 fire departments within, and adjacent to, Portage County
7. 13 Emergency Medical Service groups

10. Hazardous Materials Response Teams
11. Mutual aid requests and MABAS (Mutual Aid Box Alarm System)
12. Fire Investigation Task Force
13. Carbon monoxide calls
14. Medical Priority Dispatching System to aid callers in a medical emergency
15. Summon helicopters for Emergency Medical Services

The Communication Center also provides varying degrees of communications services to the Portage County Highway Department, State of Wisconsin Probation & Parole, Portage County District Attorney's Office, Wisconsin State Patrol Troopers working in Portage County, Red Cross, Portage County Humane Society and various tow/wrecker services.

Geographical areas of coverage:

The Portage County Sheriff's Department Communications Center provides communications services to all areas of the 810 square mile county outside the jurisdictional area of the Stevens Point Police Department. The Stevens Point Police Department Communications Center and the Sheriff's Department Communications Center assist each other during times of crises or high levels of activity. Cross training between the centers ensures the ability to maintain communications throughout the county in the event of one of the centers being inoperable. The Communications Center, as well as the entire Sheriff's Department, works to promote, preserve and deliver quality service to the citizens of Portage County by forming partnerships within the county. These partnerships enhance the security and safety of our community and lead to excellence of service.

Services provided:

The Dispatch Center provides the vital link between the call and the responders. The vital information that the dispatchers disseminate to all of the emergency responders greatly increases the level of understanding and method of response required for each incident. A Communication Officer handles numerous calls for service each day, with approximately one third of those calls being 911 calls. In 2007, the Sheriff's Department Communications Center and the Stevens Point Police Department Communications Center received over 96,000 calls for service via the 911 lines, 911 cell phone lines, and non-emergency lines. Our dispatchers answered more than 40% of 911 calls in less than one second. Over 95% of all calls were answered in less than ten seconds, which includes times when several calls are coming in at the same time. The State of Wisconsin recommended maximum average answering time is ten seconds.

The Portage County Sheriff's Department Communication Center is staffed by dedicated professionals who are committed to providing security and safety to the citizens of Portage County.

Portage County Sheriff's Department Administration Division

Staff

The five full time civilian employees of the Administration Division fill the vital role performing the duties related to the maintenance of the records management system for the Sheriff's Department. These employees are responsible for various duties such as transcribing dictated reports, providing data entry on incident and accident reports, dissemination of various law enforcement reports, preparation of civil process papers for service by deputies, coordinating information for entry into the county record program and assist in overseeing the open records procedures.

These staff members also handle reception duties by assisting visitors to the administrative offices and jail and assisting customers with requests for reports and directing telephone calls to appropriate individuals and/or departments.

The Administration Division is also responsible for the financial reports of the Department. They operate the inmate Commissary Fund and safeguard inmate monies by providing an account for deposits and disbursements. They are also responsible for the processing of monies received, invoicing for the Jail Room and Board Program, Home Detention Program, Tax Intercept Program, Collection Agency and other services, purchasing of equipment and supplies, preparation of departmental payroll, preparation of procurement payments, and preparation of payments to vendors through the voucher program.

The administrative staff is also Recording Secretary to the Portage County Public Safety/Emergency Management Committee and the Portage County Traffic Safety Commission which include the preparation of the agendas and minutes.

Additionally, the Administrative Assistant provides supervision of the administrative staff, assists with preparation of the departmental budget, grants and financial reports and serves as liaison to other county departments.

PORTAGE COUNTY SHERIFF'S DEPARTMENT

Corrections Division

Facility and Staff

The Corrections Division is comprised of the Portage County Jail and Portage County Juvenile Detention Center. The jail, which has 79 beds, is routinely at capacity or over capacity, and 30 to 50 additional inmates are held in other county's jails. The division's Captain oversees 30 security staff, including 28 Corrections Officers, a Jail Sergeant and Juvenile Detention Administrator.

A commercial kitchen, staffed by a Lead Cook and five Assistant Cooks, prepares meals for those in confinement. Medical services are contracted, with nurse practitioners and registered nurses maintaining scheduled hours in the jail. When necessary, inmates are transported to local doctors and clinics for their medical needs. The Human Services Department has a Social Worker assigned to the jail full-time to provide mental health and alcohol/drug counseling, crisis intervention and release planning. A teacher contracted through Mid-State Technical College offers instruction for the High School Equivalency Degree (HSED). Volunteers provide religious programming for those seeking spiritual guidance.

- Three times as many males as females were booked into the jail.

Classification of Inmates

Inmates are assigned a security and risk classification within 24 hours of their admission to jail (assuming they aren't promptly released on bond), and are reclassified based upon institutional behavior and legal status. Classifications range from "1" through "8" with "1" being a *high-risk* status and "8" being *low-risk*. Based upon the "Days Served" under each security classification (e.g. - "1" through "8"), inmates were assigned classifications in the following percentages.

New Technology

Upgrades were performed on the facility's camera system and locking mechanisms. A computerized comprehensive jail administration system will be implemented during the coming months.

Shipping of Inmates to Other Jails

Finding the room to house county inmates continues to be a problem. The budget for shipping inmates to other jails was increased from \$731,000 in 2007 to \$767,550 in 2008. As available space in this region becomes more scarce from year to year, it will be necessary to transport inmates increasingly longer distances. Transport costs reflect only the cost of housing inmates at other jails and don't reveal the significant man hours invested in preparing inmates for transfer or actually transporting them there.

Justice Center Project

Debate continues over the need for a new courthouse, jail and law enforcement facility. Opinions range from doing "nothing", to scaling the project back, to moving forward with the project as outlined by consultants and architects. Proponents of building a facility outside the downtown area place greater emphasis on site availability, cost, highway access and single-level design. Proponents of building in the vicinity of downtown Stevens Point emphasize downtown preservation and accessibility. The outcome of the November referendum will help to narrow the project's focus and planning.

Juvenile Detention Center

The detention center holds male and female youth from Portage County and other counties in the region. The facility has 14 beds and holds juveniles for both low level offenses, such as running away and truancy, and for major offenses such as sexual assault, robbery and homicide. Juveniles range from 10 through 17 years of age. The Stevens Point School District assigns a teacher to the center, who provides regular instruction in smaller groups. Volunteers from the Retired and Senior Volunteer Program (RSVP) mentor juveniles in groups and individual meetings. Revenues from other counties help to offset county funding of the center.

Safety Programs

School Programs

The Portage County Sheriff's Department offers school safety programs in nine different schools in Portage County. All the schools are located in the jurisdiction of Portage County. The schools are:

These are the programs offered to the schools but not limited to since the school will request presentations related to specific problems that arise throughout the school year including bully talks, personal space, and inappropriate touching.

Poison Awareness – 306 students (all Kindergarten)
Eddie The Eagle Gun Safety – 100 students (1st & 2nd grades, JFK and Rosholt)
Bike Safety – 1500+ students (2nd, 3rd, and 4th grades)
Bike Rodeo – 1200+ students (2nd, 3rd, and 4th grades)
Sheriff's Department Tours – 20 tours with an average of 15 students per tour
Safety Cadets – 355 students (4th, 5th, and 6th grades)
Driver's Education talks – 500+ students (three different driving schools in the county)
Vandalism – 150 students (4th grade)

Internet Safety – 400 students (5th & 6th grade and Adults)
Bully Talk – 350 students (14 classes – All grades)
Personal Space/Inappropriate Touching – 180 students (All ages)
Sexual Assault Talks – 350 Students (Middle School and High School Students)

Most of the topics listed above are one session talks. The Counter ACT program is more in depth and is six one hour sessions which include a presentation to the parents. Each program has material handouts for the students, which include workbooks and fun stuff for the kids. We also have gun lock giveaways and bike helmets available for families that can't afford them.

Community Programs

We also conduct Neighborhood Watch programs and in 2007, the Safety Officer attended approximately 5 meetings and set up 5 new programs. We have a strong existing Neighborhood Watch Program and it continues to grow. We also do talks at daycares, elderly housing complexes and driver education classes.

Citizen's Patrol Academy

In March of 2007 the Citizen's Patrol Academy was started back up by the Safety Officer. We had ten students sign up and complete all the classes. The Academy ran for ten weeks, one night a week, usually on Wednesdays for two hours. The classes consisted of a jail section, patrol section, OWI stops, accident reconstruction, vehicle contacts, emergency vehicle driving, firearms, defense and arrest tactics and drug investigations. Most of the students also participated in the ride along program making their class time just a little longer to better their knowledge about our department.

Crime Stoppers and Quick 50 Programs

A Detective Sergeant is responsible for the Crime Stoppers and Quick 50 Program. We run ads every other week on several local radio stations (taped by WYTE radio) and Channel 9 Television. Both the radio and television stations tape and broadcast for free as a public service. In 2007 there were 65 tips phoned in, amounting to 38 persons being arrested and 39 cases being solved. A total amount of \$2500 was paid out to tipsters throughout the year.

Department of Natural Resources Programs

The Detective Sergeant is also responsible for Department of Natural Resources Programs. Since the inception of mandatory training for youths to participate in ATV, Snowmobile and Hunter Safety, the Sheriff's Department classes have usually been filled to capacity of 40 students. In 2007, the Sheriff's Department ran four Hunter Safety courses, one Snowmobile Safety course, two ATV Safety courses and one Boating Safety course. The Sheriff's Department has approximately twelve instructors that help with these programs.

The Sheriff's Department also runs Department of Natural Resources Patrols with boats, ATVs and snowmobiles. The Portage County Sheriff's Department provided 242 hours of Boat Patrol, 34 hours of ATV Patrol and 107 hours for Snowmobile Patrol. All patrols are reimbursed through the State of Wisconsin at a rate of 60 to 100 percent. We currently have one large boat for patrol, Sea Doo personnel water craft for patrol and one small boat for rescue. We also have two snowmobiles and two ATVs.




