Clerk read the following report of the County State Road and Bridge committee.

To the Honorable Chairman and Member of the county board of Supervisors of Portage County, Gentlemen:

Your committee on county state roads and bridges, would respectively report as follows:

We have looked after all contracts on state roads and bridges, have inspected the same and either accepted them or had changes made to conform to the plans and specifications. We have inspected all the road work done under supervision of the County Highway Commissioner. We have audited all the bills and checked up all the orders given by the Highway Commissioner on all the work done by him and the several foremen and have found all of them correct. The report of the Highway Commissioner gives a detailed statement of the cost of each piece of state aid work done and we approve of said report, having compared the same with all the vouchers and records on file

in his office. In several of the towns where state aid work has been done the Chairmen of these towns have acted in the capacity of ex-officio members of this committee and have been of great help in getting the best of work done on the highways. We have also acted in our official capacity in the letting and accepting of three county aid bridges in the town of Grant, in the Eau Claire, and one in the town of New Hope, as provided by law. We have directed the expenditure of the maintenance fund provided by automobile license fees and the appropriation of the county board. Your committee has made two different trips to view auto truck demonstrations, one at Madison and one at Appleton, and are thoroughly satisfied that the work done by the truck is a great money saver to road construction. Some of the work done was surely remarkable, and we would recommend that the county purchase one or two trucks for the work in Portage county. We also recommend that a fund be created for moving the machinery. All of which is respectfully submitted.

To the honorable Board of Supervisors of Portage county. Gentlemen:—Your committee on State Aid Roads and Bridges has investigated the advisability of selecting a Trunk Line System of highways and adopting the county unit plan of operation in Portage county, under the provisions of section 1317m-5, of the statutes, and beg leave to report as follows:

We have carefully investigated the road situation in the county and believe that the present town unit plan of operation does not meet the needs of the county and that the interests of the county as a whole would be best served by operating under the county unit plan upon a Trunk Line System.

Therefore, we have carefully outlined a Trunk Line System on the attached county map, which we believe to be just and fair to all units of government in the county, and have distributed the state aid highway funds to the several Trunk lines where it will serve the interests of the greatest number of people.

We, therefore beg leave to submit the following resolution for your consideration.

To the honorable Board of Supervisors of Portage County, Wisconsin.

Gentlemen:—(1) Be It Resolved, That the following parts and portions of the county system of prospective state aid highways as shown in red on attached map are hereby declared to be Trunk Lines, and shall hereafter be known as the County Trunk Line System of Portage county, and containing in all 146 miles more or less.

Trunk Line No. 1, known as Waupaca, Stevens Point and Marshfield road, beginning at Waupaca county line in Section 1, town 22, range 10 in a northwesterly direction through towns of Lanark, Amherst, Amherst Junction, Custer, Stockton, Stevens Point, Carson, Junction City, Eau Claire to Wood county line Section 31, town 25, range 6.

Trunk line No. 2, known as the Wausau, Stevens Point, Wautoma Road commencing at Marathon County line south of Knowlton, thence southerly through the town of Dewey, Hull, City of Stevens Point, through the village of Plover to Keene, through town of Almond and village of Almond to Wausara county line between sections 33 and 34, town 21 R. 9.

Trunk line No. 3, known as Waupaca, Pleasant Valley road, commencing at Trunk Line in Section 7, town 22, range 9, near Moore barn, thence in a southeasterly direction through Buena Vista and Lanark to Waupaca county line between sections 25 and 36, town 22, range 10.

Trunk line No. 4, Plover Grand Rapids road commencing at the intersection of First and Union streets in Plover village, thence southwesterly to Meehan station and to Wood county line at the N. W. corner of Section 6, town 22, range 7.

Trunk line No. 5, Stevens Point-Rosholt road, commencing at city limits of Stevens Point or Jordan road, running in a general northeasterly direction through Jordan, Ellis, Polona through Sharon to Rosholt.

Trunk line No. 6, known as Amherst Junction-Rosholt Road, commencing at intersection of Trunk line No. 1 in village of Amherst Junction running in a northerly direction through Nelsonville through Rosholt to Marathon county line between sections 2 and 3, town 25, range 10.

Trunk line No. 7, known as the Junction City, Dancy Road, commencing at Junction City in a northerly direction through Carson and Eau Pleine to Marathon county line in section 5, township 25, range 6.

Trunk line No. 8, beginning at Lone Pine corners thence in a westerly direction through towns of Almond and Pine Grove to center of Village of Bancroft thence in a southerly direction through the town of Pine Grove to Waushara county line at a point near southwest corner of section 35 T. 21 R. 8 E.

(2) Be It Further Resolved, That the sum of one and two-tenths (1 2-10) mills be levied against all the taxable property of Portage county, the same to create a fund to be known as the county road and bridge fund.

(3) Be It Further Resolved, That after January 1, 1917, the county will pay sixty per cent, (60 percent) of the cost of improving a portion of the prospective state aid highway system, not included in the County Trunk Line System but making connection with the same or with system in adjoining county by grading, draining, surfacing, or improving in other manner approved by the State Highway Commission, provided that no tax of less than \$500.00 or more than \$1,000.00 shall be voted by a town or village in any one year and that the whole joint town and county fund shall be used in making one continuous improvement.

And that all appropriations under this resolution shall be expended under the supervision of the County State Road and Bridge Committee and County Highway Commissioner, in the same manner and under the same provisions as the state aid funds are expended upon the Trunk lines.

(4) Be It Further Resolved, that after January 1, 1917, the county shall maintain by dragging or otherwise all of the County Trunk Line System and all highways built with county aid only, under the provisions of this resolution.

(5) Be It Further Resolved, That the sum of twenty-eight hundred fifty (\$2850.00) dollars be deducted from the county road and bridge fund for the purpose of granting county aid only to the towns of Grant, Belmont and Lanark, Pine Grove it being understood that the herein mentioned towns are not being directly benefitted by expenditures on the Trunk lines, appropriated for 1917 construction.

(6) Be It Further Resolved, That the sum of two thousand (\$2,000.00) dollars be deducted from the county road and bridge fund to be used for maintenance purposes, together with all moneys received from the state as the county's share of the automobile license fund, said fund to be known as the county maintenance fund. It being the duty of the county state road and bridge committee to supervise the expenditure of the county maintenance fund under the provision of sub section 8 of section 1317m-5, of the statutes.

(7) Be It Further Resolved, That the sum of \$2435.23 dollars be deducted from the county road and bridge fund to reimburse the following named towns, who have expended the 1917 fund in 1916, under the provisions of sub section 7a of 1317m-4 of the statutes, as follows: Eau Pleine \$411.50, Plover Town \$1147.93 with balance in fund of \$54.02, Nelsonville village \$875.80 with balance in fund of \$51.95.

(8) Be It Further Resolved, That the county state road and bridge committee is hereby given authority to build any necessary culverts or bridges, whose contract price shall not exceed \$1,000.00 upon any Trunk line and pay for the same out of the appropriations due the portions of the trunk line serving the interests of the towns and villages in which such culverts or bridges shall lie.

(9) Be It Further Resolved, That the county state road and bridge committee be authorized to accept donations under the provisions of sub section 1a of section 1317m-5, of the statutes, and add same to the appropriations for the Trunk Line System designated by such donors.

BE IT RESOLVED, That after deducting the above mentioned sums from

the county road and bridge fund, the balance, together with the state aid for highways allotted to Portage county, be expended upon the several county Trunk Lines in the following described manner.

Trunk line No. 1, starts at Black River bridge and runs westerly as far as money will reach, \$6,000.00.

On Trunk Line No. 1, commencing at end of macadam near Stockton Station and west, \$3,000.00.

On Trunk Line No. 1, commencing at east end of 1916 macadam in town of Hull and easterly through town of Hull, \$3,000.00.

Trunk Line No. 2, commencing at north end of 1915 macadam and northerly through Hull, \$3,000.00.

Trunk Line No. 2, commencing at Moore barn in Section 7, town 22, range 9, of Buena Vista south towards Keene, \$3,000.00.

Trunk Line No. 3, commencing at Moore barn in section 4, town 22, range 9, easterly through Buena Vista, \$3,000.00.

Trunk Line No. 4, commencing at intersection of First and Union streets in the village of Plover and west towards Meehan Station, \$4,000.00.

Trunk Line No. 5, Starts at end of 1916 macadam and running north Easterly towards Rosholt, \$4,000.00.

Trunk Line No. 6, commencing at north end of 1916 gravel road in town of New Hope and running north towards Rosholt, \$3,000.00.

Trunk Line No. 8, commencing in village of Bancroft southerly as far as money will go \$1,500 to be expended in connection with the \$1990.75 state aid fund available.

The balance in any of the funds available to be used for emergency purposes where the county state road and bridge committee deem necessary.

Moved by Supervisor Halverson that the rules be suspended and the resolution adopted. Ayes and nays called for. Motion carried by 27 ayes and 3 nays. The following voted aye: Supervisors Brekke, Brunker, Wilson, Starks, Sawyer, Berry, Tovey, Tetzloff, Thorpe, Steinke, Laszewski, Stertz, Jordan, Frost, Halverson, Loberg, Pratt, Parks, Whiteside, Gilbert, Lukasavitz, Park, Mansur, Atwell, Haka, Carpenter, Aldrich. Nays: Supervisors Beggs, Shanklin Wanta.

Clerk read the report of T. E. Cauley, county highway commissioner on the expenditure of the auto repair fund which was referred to the committee on state aid roads and bridges.

Clerk read the following resolution:

Whereas, in case the Federal Highway Aid requires a like amount of county aid together with the state aid to become available in 1917. Be it Resolved by the County Board of Portage county be met with the appropriation made at this session of the county board, for the highways designated as federal and trunk line roads.

Dated Nov. 23, 1916. J. B. Carpenter, supervisor 5th ward, city.

Moved by Supervisor Sawyer that the resolution be adopted. Motion carried.

Clerk read applications of H. J. Kankrud, A. F. Else and J. W. Drake for county farm agent.

Moved by Supervisor Carpenter that the board proceed to elect a county farm agent and matron. Motion carried.

The chairman appointed as tellers Supervisors Brekke and Beggs.

Board proceeded to an informal ballot for county farm agent and matron. Whole number of votes cast was 30 of which H. J. Kankrud received 23; A. F. Else 3; J. W. Drake 4.

Moved by Supervisor Laszewski that as Mr. H. J. Kankrud had received a majority of the votes cast, the informal ballot be declared formal and he be declared elected poor farm agent. Motion carried.

Clerk read applications of Drs. C. E. Smith and G. E. Dusenberry for the position of County farm physician.

Moved by Supervisor Sawyer that the board proceed to elect a county farm physician. Motion carried.

Board proceeded to an informal ballot for county farm physician. Whole number of votes cast was 30 of which Dr. C. E. Smith received 23 and Dr. C. E. Dusenberry 7.

Moved by Supervisor Starks that as Dr. C. E. Smith had received a majority of votes cast, the informal ballot be declared formal and he be declared county farm physician. Motion carried.

Moved by Supervisor Beggs that the board proceed to elect a county state road and bridge committee. Motion carried.

Board proceeded to an informal ballot for first member of the county state road and bridge committee. Whole number of votes cast was 30 of which Ben Halverson received 11, John Berry 2, D. W. Parks 2, Wm. Brunker 7, J. Laszewski 3, James Tovey 5.

Board proceeded to first formal ballot for the first member of the county state road and bridge committee. Whole number of votes cast was 30, of which Ben Halverson received 18, Jos. Laszewski 1, James Tovey 3, Wm. Brunker 8.

The chairman announced that as Supervisor Halverson had received a majority of the votes cast he be declared elected first member of the county state road and bridge committee.

Board proceeded to informal ballot for second member of the county state road and bridge committee. Whole number of votes cast was 30 of which Wm. Brunker received 16, John Berry 5, D. W. Parks 4, Jas. Tovey 4, Jos. Laszewski 1.

Moved by Supervisor Tetzloff that as Supervisor Brunker had received a majority of votes cast, the informal ballot be declared formal and Supervisor Brunker be declared elected second member of the county state road and bridge committee. Motion carried.

Board proceeded to informal ballot for third member of the county state road and bridge committee. Whole number of votes cast was 29, of which James Tovey received 10, D. W. Parks 6, Jas. Laszewski 7, John Berry 4, Blank 2.

Board proceeded to first formal ballot for third member of the county state road and bridge committee. Whole number of votes cast was 30, of which James Tovey received 15, D. W. Parks 7, Jas. Laszewski 7, John Berry 1.

Board proceeded to second formal ballot for third member of the county state road and bridge committee. Whole number of votes cast was 30 of which James Tovey received 18, Jos. Laszewski 6, D. W. Parks 6.

The chairman announced that as Supervisor Tovey had received a majority of the votes cast he be declared elected third member of the county state road and bridge committee.

Moved by Supervisor Sawyer that the board proceed to elect a county farm committee. Motion carried.

Moved by Supervisor Carpenter that Supervisor Sawyer be elected first member of the county farm committee by acclamation. Motion carried.

Moved by Supervisor Berry that Supervisor Tetzloff be elected as second member of the county farm committee by acclamation. Motion carried.

Board proceeded to an informal ballot for third member of the county farm committee. Whole number of votes cast was 30 of which G. D. Aldrich received 4, G. K. Mansur 8, Richard Wilson 10, George Stertz 5, D. W. Sawyer 1, S. Tetzloff 1, Bert Shanklin 1.

Board proceeded to first formal ballot for third member of the County Farm Committee. Whole number of votes cast was 30, of which Richard Wilson 9, G. K. Mansur 11, G. Stertz 5, G. D. Aldrich 4, John Jordan 1.

Board proceeded to second formal ballot for third member of the county farm committee. Whole number of votes cast was 30, of which G. K. Mansur

Board proceeded to third formal ballot for third member of the county farm committee. Whole number of votes cast was 30, of which G. K. Mansur received 18, Richard Wilson 11, G. D. Aldrich 1.

Stevens Point, Wis., Nov. 25, 1916, 8:30 o'clock.

Meeting called to order by Chairman Hon. G. L. Park.

Clerk called the roll. All members present.

Minutes of yesterday's session read and approved.

Clerk read a resolution in regard to clerk hire for the county treasurer.

Moved by Supervisor Sawyer that the resolution be laid over until a further date. Motion carried.

Clerk read the following resolution:

Whereas, the apportionment of the money appropriated by the state of Wisconsin for rural highways, is made wholly on the basis of the valuation of the property of each county and does not take into consideration the number of miles of road or the size of a country, and

Whereas, such apportionment is manifestly unjust, and

Whereas, in the National Road Law the apportionment of the money appropriated for Wisconsin and all the states by the United States government, is made upon the number of miles of rural routes, the area, or size of the state, and the population of the state, and

Whereas, the apportionment made by the National government to the states is a logical and more just apportionment than the apportionment made by the state of Wisconsin to the several counties.

Now Therefore Be It Resolved, that it is the judgment of the County Board of Portage County, that said state road law be amended so the apportionment of the money appropriated by the state for road purposes, shall be as follows: One-third of said money appropriated by the state to each county in the ratio that the number of miles of the rural routes in said county bears to the total number of rural routes in the state; one-third of said money appropriated to be apportioned in the ratio that the number of square miles contained in the county bears to the number of square miles contained in the whole state; one-third of said money appropriated to be apportioned in the ratio that the population of said county bears to the population of the whole state.

That the member of assembly and state senator representing said county, be and they are hereby instructed to use all honorable means to have the said highway law amended according to the suggestions in this resolution, and to present said resolution to said state legislature.

Dated Nov. 25, 1916. D. W. Sawyer, Supervisor of Belmont.

We submit herewith the cancelled county orders for destruction, also 70 interest coupons for \$3150.00, also one bond for coupon No. 3 of Bond No. 40 of Portage County, Wisconsin, for the sum of forty-five dollars, said bond to be filed in the county treasurer's office, coupons to be punched and filed in the office, also cancelled bonds for \$10,000.

Stevens Point, Wis., Nov. 30, 1916, 9 o'clock a. m.

Meeting called to order by Chairman Hon. G. L. Park.

Clerk called the roll. All members present except Supervisor Wanta excused.

Minutes of yesterday's session read and approved.

Moved by Supervisor Halverson that the report of the County Agricultural Representative J. M. Coyner be read and printed in the official proceedings of the board. Motion carried.

Clerk read the following report of the County Agricultural Representative:

REPORT OF PORTAGE COUNTY AGRICULTURAL REPRESENTATIVE J. M. COYNER

To the Honorable County Board of Supervisors of Portage County, Wis. Mr. Chairman and Gentlemen:—The following is the report of the work done in Portage county by the County Representative since he began his work here. The county representative began work on March fourth with his headquarters at the county farm at Amherst Junction. He has devoted his time to three lines of work, in Portage County in general and on the County Poor Farm in particular (which work on the county farm will be set forth in a separate report.)

1. Improvement of the quality of the potato seed stock.
2. Increase in the number, quality and the production of the live stock of the county.
3. To improve the light sandy soils of the county.

The work done along these several lines will be presented under the three following heads.

(a) Purpose, (b) Method, (c) Results.

SYNOPSIS OF POTATO WORK

PURPOSE:—(1) To improve the market quality, reduce the number of varieties of potatoes grown in the county to a few standard varieties adapted to the local conditions and desirable from a market standpoint.

(2) To advertise in an organized way Portage County potatoes to the buyers of the world.

METHOD:—(1) The first step in this potato work was to organize as many local potato growers' associations in the county as could be handled during the summer. The purpose of these organizations is to get a group of men together in different parts of the county who are interested in growing better potatoes and in making their community noted as a potato growing section.

Six of these Potato Institutes were held before the planting season: Bancroft, March 28; Plover, March 30th; Amherst, March 31st; New Hope, April 10; Almond, May 5; Arnott, May 20th. At each of these meetings a local potato growers' association was organized, the total membership being one hundred and fifty.

These meetings were carried on with the help of the State Potato Growers' Association, that organization furnished a man to speak at the meetings which were advertised and managed by the county representative. Five follow up meetings were held in these different communities, August 10, 11, 12 at Amherst, Arnott, Almond and Plover. August 16, arranged for field meeting to be held at Bancroft by J. W. Hicks of the Potato Growers' Association.

These organizations will be used for other things than to promote potato growing. They will be called together to hold meeting that will be devoted entirely to soils problems. On other occasions the meetings will be specialized on live stock. Others silos, etc. One of the strange features of such an organization is the fact that it can use local information. We secured an abundant of valuable information on these trips upon the subjects of varieties, cultivation, diseases and insects, from the farmers who were producing the crops. The county representative is of the opinion that these specialized institutes of the local nature have a very important place in Agricultural Extension work. Much of the institute work in the past has been so general

Dunegan, and Mr. Hoverstad, the agricultural agent of the Soo Line, 75 bushels of Soy beans to 50 farmers. These were grown on very sandy soils of the county in Hull, Stockton and Plover for the most part.

The county representative tested soil in the following towns: Almond, Plover, Buena Vista, Eau Pleine, Stockton, Amherst, New Hope and Lanark. The soils were acid in all of these places. They were very much so in the neighborhood of Arnott, on the Prairie and near Almond on the Prairie.

RESULTS—There will probably be a much larger acreage of soy beans next year than there was this year. Two marsh soil institutes have been scheduled, one to be held at Coddington, the other to be held at Bancroft. Two light soil institutes will be held at Custer and Arnott. These will be scheduled in a few days. These meetings will be devoted entirely to the local problems that confront the particular communities. These meetings will be planned and supervised by the county representative. The Soils Department of the university of Wisconsin will cooperate by furnishing speakers for the several meetings.

Four farmers have agreed to take a carload of limestone to Arnott. This will be applied to soil where clover grows very poorly. The bacteria in a good many cases seems to be entirely dead. Artificial inoculation will be applied on these fields where the limestone is applied.

The county representative has been called upon to assist in putting in alfalfa on five different farms in the county. A special institute has been scheduled to be held at Rosholt on Nov. 28. Special information will be given to these farmers on growing alfalfa under their own particular conditions. Samples of soil will be tested from the fields where they expect to sow the alfalfa. The cost of limestone will be discussed and the proper way to apply it with the least expense.

LIVE STOCK

PURPOSE:—To improve the quality of the cattle and increase the number in the county, and to advertise our cattle to outside markets.

The county representative has organized a Cow Testing Association in the eastern end of the county. This organization is named the Amherst-Nelsonville Cow Testing Association. It is composed of thirty herds including about four hundred cows. The officers are Henry Swenson, president; Arthur Peterson, secretary and treasurer. The directors are Will Drake, N. K. Sannes, and Hanford Johnson. Work will probably be started the first of December. This will be the fifty-fourth association in the state. This will be the second association now in operation in the county. The other one is the Alban-New Hope association, organized last winter. The county representative has been cooperating with the Alban-New Hope Association during the summer. A demonstration was put on at the Stevens Point fair in September to show the relative standing of the individual cows in the association. Charts were printed showing the ranking of all of the cows according to production and the cost of feed.

Two of the best cows in the association were exhibited at the fair. One a Grade Guernsey belonged to Mr. Ed. Erickson, the other a Pure Bred Holstein, belonged to Mr. Anton Brekke of Rosholt. Both of these cows are making good records and they represented well a desirable standard of production for a Cow Testing Association. The charts attracted considerable attention and helped to get several of the members into the new association just organized at Amherst and Nelsonville. This demonstration was mentioned in the report of the State Dairyman's Association this last month.

The county representative requested the fair association to make classes for grade dairy cows. There was a good exhibit of grades and a good outlook for next year. He made a special effort to promote the live stock departments of both the fairs in the county. A number of herds were at each fair because of his own personal solicitation. The figures this year compare as follows with those of last year.

The county representative organized a live stock parade at each fair and served as judge for live stock at the Amherst fair.

A stock judging contest was conducted at the Portage-Waupaca Guernsey Breeder's association, which was held at Nelsonville June 20th. This was one of the largest picnics of the kind held in the state during the year. There were seventeen boys took part in this contest. Prizes were given for placing the animals.

A permanent Calf Club has been organized in the county. There are fifteen members in this organization, including boys between the ages of ten and eighteen. The purpose of this organization is to develop a community spirit in the production of live stock. These young people will get the following things from being members of this organization. They will understand the benefit of working together on a project such as live stock production. They have learned already that public recognition can most easily be attracted by a community rather than by individual effort. They have met in a business way with some of the leading men of the county. Not only men who are breeders of live stock but men engaged in other lines of business. For example a meeting of the club was held at Stevens Point on Sept. 30th. Each member was invited to come and bring his mother. A banquet was served at which some of the bankers of the county, city officials and fair board members were present. Their work has been recognized and commented upon by the agricultural papers of the state. Thirteen of the fifteen members of the club exhibited their calves at the Stevens Point fair. All of the owners of the calves attended the fair and were admitted free.

The two best calves were sent to the state fair at Milwaukee together with the owners. The county representative secured permission from the state fair officials to enter the calves one day late. (The two fairs came the same week.) He secured this money from several of the bankers of the county to pay the expenses of the trip and of the man sent along with the boys. (The county representative could not get away from the local fair.) One of these calves, a grade Jersey, grown by Leonard O'Keefe of Arnott, took second place at the state fair. The other calf, a grade Holstein, grown by Carl Swenson of Amherst, took first place, and was selected as the grand champion calf in the Junior calf contest at the state fair. The Portage County Calf Club was given second place among the clubs of the state. The basis of making the comparisons of the clubs, was membership, number of calves at the fair, Quality. And supervision of the contest during the summer. The county representative made three rounds to inspect this work and to weigh the calves.

The club will be assembled at the community institute that is to be held at the Normal college this winter. We are expecting to have Mr. T. L. Bewick, the state leader of boys' and girls' club work, to come and give a talk to the members of the Portage County Calf Club. One of the things that is being taught to the boys is that they are doing something for their county and for each other as well as themselves.

Next year poultry and swine will be included in the club.

The county representative has placed six bulls in sections where well bred-bulls are very rare. Two near Polonia and two in Stockton, one in Plover and one in Lanark. Two boars have also been placed. He keeps a list of the good bulls in the county that must be disposed of and in this way is in position to make exchanges and to save good bulls from going to the block.

By way of advertising Portage county live stock to the northern counties he helped the Mr. C. W. Householder, the county agent from Rusk county, to get a carload of Guernsey heifers to take to Rusk county. These cattle were sold on the fair grounds at Ladysmith at public auction, not more than one being sold to one settler. So far as can be determined, this is the first time that a car load of Portage county cattle have ever been sold in a public way as Portage county stock.

He has helped farmers in Buena Vista, Lanark and Plover to secure cows. He has been of service in the following way—by helping the farmer to locate the cows, making sure that they were all right, and going to the farmer's banker and securing the necessary credit.

Two of the pure bred bulls were secured in this way, and one cow. In one instance a farmer came to the county agent to find where he could buy some cows. The county agent did not know where they could be found but went to one of the town chairmen and consulted with him. The chairman not only referred him to farmers who had something to sell, but went along to look them over with the prospective buyer and the county representative. The trade was made and the cows, twelve in all, were kept in the county. There is a rim of good live stock almost entirely around the county. It is highly desirable that the surplus live stock, be sent into the interior of the county as much as possible.

The chairmen of the respective towns can be of great service to the agricultural interests of their towns in many ways. The county representative earnestly requests their cooperation. Several instances might be given to suggest how important your assistance is.

One chairman arranged a meeting at the town hall and secured a good attendance in a community when the county agent was a stranger there. Another has donated a hall to be used for a Soils Institute. Another furnished a cow for the Cow Testing Demonstration at the Stevens Point Fair. Another secured several members for the new cow testing association. Another is cooperating with the representative to encourage a group of farmers to a piece of road work. Another helped the county representative to secure several bushels of the county exhibit of potatoes for the state potato show at Eau Claire. Another furnished a fine sample of potatoes for the county exhibit. Another helped to organize a Potato Growers' Association. Doubtless others have helped in ways that have not come to the attention of the county agent. Nevertheless their work is appreciated just as much.

One County Live Stock Institute was held at Amherst Junction. This meeting was held in cooperation with the State Live Stock Breeders' Association. The speakers were, L. P. Martiny of Chippewa Falls, F. H. Scribner of Rosendale, and W. L. Houser of Mondovi. Animals were on the grounds for demonstration purposes. There were about four hundred people present.

A two days' institute will be held at Coddington and one at Bancroft. One of the days at each institute will be devoted to live stock, the other to soils. Application has been made for similar meetings at Custer, Arnott and Junction City.

EDUCATION—COUNTY SHORT COURSE TO BE LOCATED AT AMHERST

PURPOSE—The purpose of this course is to accommodate those farm boys who do not have the opportunity of going away from home for an agricultural education. It is the boy who expects to milk and feed cows with his own hands, clean out the barn, plant, cultivate, and harvest crops with his own hands that this course is intended to reach. One of the serious problems of agricultural education has been the inability to reach the great class of farm boys who are expecting to be farmers themselves.

This County Short Course is offered free to all the residents of the county. The student should have a good common school education and should be at least fourteen years of age. For the details of the course see Bulletin of the University of Wisconsin, Serial Number 733, County Short Course in Agriculture.

This course was located at Amherst for the following reasons: (1) It is the object of this course to begin by interesting the boys who are actually on the farm by bringing an agricultural course within their reach.

(2) The nature of the course makes it imperative that it be started where the class of students who need it can take advantage of it.

CONSTRUCTION:—Through the cooperation of the department of agri-

cultural engineering at Madison, Professor F. M. White, the head of the department, spent two days in the county. Four Septic tanks were laid out and one hydraulic ram. Two barn sites staked out and plans were furnished by the department of agricultural engineering.

Meetings and speeches on Agricultural subjects. 21 meetings. Total present 3,414. Press notes, 30. Letters, 490. Office calls, 70. Visits, 447. Miles traveled, 3,200. Miscellaneous.

Twenty-two pigs castrated for farmers. Five calls to attend sick animals. Four hay ropes spliced.

The county representative arrived at the county farm at noon Saturday, March 4. He realized that it would take some time to familiarize himself with the particular problems of the institution. However he set about this task at once by making an inspection of the live stock end of the institution in company with the superintendent, and received from him a comprehensive history of the live stock end of the farm for several years back. The county representative appreciated the cooperation and the good spirit shown from the beginning of his work there. The following figures and illustrations in this report are submitted for the purpose of showing where and how better results can be obtained next year.

It seemed to the county representative that the proper place to begin work was in the live stock end of the farm. The live stock work began by weighing the milk from each cow, night and morning, and taking composite samples for a test for butter fat. After four days figures had been secured we began feeding according to the production of the individual cows. A mixture of two (60) parts of ground oats and one (30) part of commercial feed called 'Arcady' and 10 pounds of corn meal. (The silage was very short of corn.) Oil meal would have been a good addition, but as there was none on hand I did not buy any. The object in view was to get results with the feeds and the cows that were already in the barn only to employ different methods. For example a feed truck was made at a cost of a few dollars, large enough to hold sufficient silage for the entire herd and the young stock. This made it easy for one and the same man to always do the feeding and to always feed the same amounts of silage. A metal scoop was provided that would hold just two pounds of the mixture of grain feed that was being fed. Each week a slip of paper was made out showing the proper amounts of feed that should be given to each cow. In this way all of the thirty-four head of cows and heifers in the stanchions could be fed easily and accurately within twenty minutes BY THE SAME MAN.

There was a little objection on the part of the hired help and one of the inmates who helped with the milking a part of the time, over weighing the milk. They soon caught the spirit and began to take interest in the quantity of milk that they were getting. However, it was necessary to always weigh and post the weight on the milk sheet for one of the inmate milkers. At the end of the month of March there was an increase of twenty-five percent in the quantity of milk from the same number of cows that were milking at the beginning of the month. This percentage was figured on the first four days that the county representative made the observations; a concrete illustration may illustrate the point more clearly. It was necessary to get a new ten gallon milk can to hold the milk on account of the increase in production per cow.

These figures and illustrations in this report are submitted for the purpose of showing where and how better results can be obtained for next year.

The following figures will show the production of the heard for the past year and the year previous.

Total value of dairy products \$1,545.83
Gain last year over the previous year \$283.72

This represents the production of 22 mature cows during the year and two heifers that freshened after May first. This makes an average of sixty-one dollars and eighty-three cents. The herd was tested six times for butter fat. Eight of the poorest cows were sold off from the farm, so that had the figures from these been separated, the average would have been somewhat higher.

There is room for improvement in the production of the cows. The important part in this work is to keep making continual progress.

HOGS—The county representative devoted a part of his time to taking care of the hogs. One of the problems on the county farm was a place to house the swine during the winter. The figures given on a special sheet show the comparison with the production of hogs on the farm last year. There were no hogs sold from the county farm during the year '14-15. The hogs sold paid for all the feed fed to swine and one thousand five hundred and eighty pounds of dressed pork for the operation of the house besides.

FIELD CROPS—The county representative had no supervision of the field crops, except five acres of Alfalfa, the demonstration potato plot and the soy bean plot; and to supervise the treating of all the potato seed stock with formaldehyde for scab.

Five acres of alfalfa were sown under the direction of the county representative. Strips were sown without lime and without either lime or inoculation. The soil was limed at the rate of four tons per acre. It was inoculated with sweet clover soil secured from the right of way of the Soo railway. The alfalfa was sown on the 23rd of June; the crop came up well and endured the hot summer months. A part of the alfalfa was down in hog lots where it can be used as pasture another year.

SOY BEANS—A plot of Soy beans was sown on a corner of a field where the sand had blown and drifted badly during the sand storm of last year. They were inoculated with soil from another field. The hot dry weather was hard on them. They yielded at the rate of six bushel to the acre. Next year this very plot will be sown to soy beans, the following year it will be planted to corn.

Mr. J. M. Coyner, county agricultural representative, addressed the board on the work he has been doing.

REPORT OF PORTAGE COUNTY SCHOOLS FROM JUNE 30, 1915

I have the honor to submit, herewith, my sixth annual report as County Superintendent of the County Schools. I shall in this report endeavor to show the merits and defects of our schools and make such recommendations as in my judgment should be made. What we should consider at all times is how to give the boys and girls of this county the very best common school education, and in this way make it possible for them to live as good, respectable American citizens. The boys of today are the ones that are going to manage the matters of this county in the time that is to come, in the near future.

During the year 225 visits were made and 112 evening programs and contests were attended. The teachers of the Normal school and Pres. John F. Sims have been very helpful when asked to speak at these gatherings. The social center movement and contest work has been well started in the county, but in some places it still needs encouragement. Last year nearly every school had two or more of these meetings or programs.

The Spelling, Arithmetic and Penmanship contests were carried out as follows:—Each district held its own contest and the winner attended a town contest that was under the supervision of a chairman who was a teacher in each town. The winner from the town contest represented the town at the county contest held on June 3d at the Normal school at Stevens Point. All the contests were most interesting and the pupils spelled very ably but most particularly was this true of the county contest. The county superintendent was assisted in these contests by Prof. O. W. Neale, director of the rural course at the Stevens Point Normal school. The pupil who had the highest average in Arithmetic, Spelling and Penmanship was declared the winner of the county contest. This honor was received by Miss Norma Fewings of Plover, a pupil of school district No. 2, town of Plover. Miss Fewing represented Portage county at the state contests held at Milwaukee at the state fair in September and carried off first honors in spelling. Portage county is rightfully proud of such pupils.

A rather new form of social center gathering is the district fair. A large number of these gatherings were held last fall, but, owing to poor crops, they have not been so numerous this year. This is a splendid method of encouraging better farming.

Six of the teachers in the rural schools conducted evening schools to which boys and girls and men and women attended. Here they taught Reading, Arithmetic and Writing. Very good results are reported from these schools.

On June 3rd the county commencement exercises were held at the Normal school where 161 boys and girls received county diplomas. With this central county commencement the graduating from the county school is strongly emphasized and the boys and girls take more pride in completing the course in the rural schools. It is the plan to continue both the county commencement exercises and the spelling contest work.

The program on commencement day consisted chiefly of a play "Back to the Farm" presented by the students of the Rural course department under the direction of Miss Jennie Graham, assistant in this department. This play was given in two villages in the county.

One day institutes were held at each of the following places: Amherst Junction, Rosholt, Almond and Junction City. Most of the teachers attended the Central Wisconsin Teachers' Association held in Stevens Point in October. Besides this Reading Circle meetings and small conferences were held in several school houses in the county.

On Nov. 19, 1915, the Portage County School Board convention was held at the Normal school and about 400 men and women with about 75 teachers were present. These school board conventions are a means of instructing school board members in the school progress, and, as a result, much more interest is taken in school improvement. Such matters as proper lighting, seating, ventilating and general sanitary conditions are taken up. As a result many school boards have purchased single adjustable seats and made many school improvements.

The several districts that have made improvements to rather an extended degree are as follows:

School district No. 1 in town of Sharon, has built a modern brick veneer school building, school district No. Jt. 5, town of Dewey has a very good new brick school house; District No. 11 in town of Stockton has gone further, having organized a graded school district and built a brick school house of two departments with a large basement and furnace. The building is completed and is one of the best in the county.

The graded school district at Junction City has built a four room building with a large basement. The community may well be proud of this fine school house.

School district No. Jt. 5 of Pine Grove voted to consolidate with graded school district No. 6 at Bancroft and at present these two school districts are known as consolidated school district No. 1, town of Pine Grove. Three wagons are engaged to transport the children to and from school at a monthly salary of \$30.00, \$40.00 and \$50.00 respectively. This is the only consolidated school district in the county that is now under operation.

School districts that were No. 1, 2, 3 and 4 in the town of Buena Vista are divided and are known as district No. 10 and 11 of the town of Buena Vista.

The Committee on Common Schools composed of Frank R. Springer, chairman; Mrs. C. E. Shortell, secretary and Mr. John G. Marchel appointed Miss Alice Gordon and Miss Elizabeth McGoorty as supervising teachers. Miss Gordon, who was the supervising county teacher for the past year, spent all her time in supervising the schools of the county or holding meetings and conferences with teachers. She visited 123 different teachers, although she visited some twice or even three times and in some cases remained for more than one day. She visited 70 teachers once, 90 teachers twice and 20 teachers three times. As a result of the help that teachers received from this additional supervision the work in real teaching is much improved. The benefactors are the boys and girls in the schools of Portage county.

Through the kindness of the Portage County Board of Supervisors while

meeting in Stevens Point in November, 1915, it was possible to have a more satisfactory scheme for the county diploma examinations. The board appropriated a sum of money so that a board of examiners could be had for this purpose. Ten of the teachers in the county were selected to act on this Board of Examiners. It was possible to hold these examinations in twelve centers for the county supervising teacher, Miss Gordon, and the county superintendent assisted. Pupils are encouraged to take these examinations by giving them the opportunity of writing even on a few subjects and if they pass these credits are recorded in the office and the pupils are not required to take any examination in this subject the following spring. These standings are sent to each child with a letter of encouragement. There were 71 of such children that wrote last spring.

In conclusion, permit me to say that the school spirit in general is very good. Many of the school boards are anxious to get the best teachers, the best books, and are willing to get the necessary material for the good of the school. I hope that in the future, as in the past, we may ever keep the thought fresh in our minds that good schools can be brought about only by the united and harmonious co-operation of the pupils, parents, teachers and county superintendent.

This I sincerely hope will be done and I assure you that our schools will continue to make progress as in the past.

Thanking your honorable members of the board of supervisors for past favors, and trusting that I may again have your co-operation in the interest of the common schools of Portage county, I am,

RULES OF THE BOARD.

Rules adopted by the Board of Supervisors Of Portage County at the November Session, 1916

- Rule 1. The hour for daily meeting of this board shall be at 9 o'clock a. m. unless otherwise ordered.
- Rule 2. The chairman shall take the chair at the time to which the board stands adjourned, and the board shall then be called to order, and the roll of members called.
- Rule 3. Upon the appearance of a quorum, the journal of the preceding day shall be read by the clerk, and any mistakes therein may be corrected by the board; provided that upon the last day of the session the journal for that day shall be read by the clerk, and before the final adjournment corrected by the board.
- Rule 4. The chair shall preserve order, and shall decide questions of order, subject to an appeal of the board.
- Rule 5. The chairman shall vote on all questions taken by yeas and nays, except on appeal for his own decisions.
- Rule 6. Every member, previous to his speaking, shall arise and address himself to the chair.
- Rule 7. When two or more members rise at once, the chair shall designate the member who is first to speak. But in all cases, the member who shall first rise and address the chair, shall speak first.
- Rule 8. No motion shall be debated or put unless the same be seconded. It shall be stated by the chairman before debate; and any such motion shall be reduced to writing if any member desires it.
- Rule 9. Every written resolution or motion shall have prefixed thereto the name of the person introducing it. And when ordered by a committee the names of said committee shall be endorsed thereon.
- Rule 10. A vote on any question shall be taken by the yeas and nays when called for by any member of the board.
- Rule 11. No rule of the board shall be suspended, altered or amended without the concurrence of two-thirds of the members present.
- Rule 12. On the meeting of the board after the reading and the correcting of the journal of the preceding day, the order of business shall be as follows: 1st. Reception of petitions, memorials, etc. 2d. Resolutions may be offered and considered. 3d. Reports of committees and consideration thereof. 4th. Consideration of miscellaneous business on the table.
- Rule 13. No account or claim against the county shall be audited unless it be made out in items, and duly verified, and be filed with the clerk of the board in the manner prescribed by law, except as provided by Chapter 153, General Laws of 1868, unless by consent of two-thirds of the members present.
- Rule 14. As amended November, 1898: All resolutions appropriating money shall be voted upon by yeas and nays, and shall not be acted

upon until the next day after presentation, without the consent of the majority of the members elected.

- Rule 15. It shall be the duty of the chairman of all committees to report work completed, or progress of work, upon the call of committee according to Rule 12.
