Clerk read the following opinion from the District Attorney: To the Honorable, The County Board of Portage County:

At request of some of the members, I have been asked to give my opinion concerning the per diem which should be allowed to the Board at its session and as to the number of days to be allowed at \$5.00.

In consulting the statutes, I find that the legal per diem is \$4.00, but that the Board may raise the per diem to \$5.00 for a limited number of days. The statute limits the days to not more than twenty in this county. The statute also provides for the per diem to be allowed members for work on committees, and limits that to thirty days' work on committees. See section 59.03-2-f and 59.06.

After a careful reading of these statutes, together with the resolution of the County Board, passed at the time the per diem was increased to \$5.00, it is my opinion that the Board is allowed \$5.00 per day for not to exceed fifteen days, while in actual session and that the per diem for work on committees and for more than fifteen days in session, remain at the old \$4.00 per day.

Second, Be It Resolved, That we proceed to make plans to erect suitable buildings for that purpose on the south side of the railroad on a site hereinafter selected by the County Board or building committee.

Therefore, Be It Further Resolved, That the county building committee be and is hereby instructed and authorized to make or procure plans and specifications for such necessary buildings and submit the same to the County Board for its approval or correction, at a special session to be called by the chairman on or before April 1, 1921.

Committee on settlement with County Board of Education.

To the Honorable Chairman and Members of the County Board of Supervisors of Portage County, Wisconsin:

Gentlemen:

I have the honor to submit for your consideration a report of the work done in the interests of Portage county schools for the past year.

There are 152 teachers in the county teaching 125 schools. Four year high schools are maintained in the villages of Almond and Amherst. Graded schools of the first class are located in Bancroft, Junction City and Rosholt. Graded schools of the second class are at Amherst Junction, Nelsonville and Custer. This leaves a total of 117 one-room schools that were maintained during the past school year in this county outside of the city of Stevens Point.

The committee on common schools composed of Lyman Precourt, chairman, John Marchel, secretary and Martin Heffron

appointed Miss Lucile Berard and Miss Regina Somers as supervising teachers.

From Nov. 1, 1919 to Nov. 1, 1920 4460 pieces of mail were received in this office and 6788 pieces of mail were sent out.

During that same time 3128 visitors came to the office.

Last year's report contained a discussion of the new school laws. There has been no regular session of the legislature since that report was made but there were one or two laws of interest to the schools which were passed by the special session of the legislature last spring. One of these laws provides a minimum salary of \$75 per month for rural school teachers and places the minimum salary of supervising teachers at \$100 per month.

At a meeting of people who are interested in club work we decided to promote this activity in co-operation with the County Agricultural Agent. Hundreds of people in Portage County have practically demanded that this work be stimulated and carried on with more enthusiasm.

According to Sec. 59.87 of the Laws of Wisconsin the County Agricultural Agent is required to co-operate in the school work of the county.

Sub-division (f) of Subsection No. 1 of Sec. 59.87 reads as follows in referring to the duties of the County Agent:

"To give such assistance as possible in the development of agricultural teaching in the schools of the county." We intend to comply with that provision of the law in several ways.

The club work mentioned above is one way in which we intend to fulfill the requirement. We feel that the teaching of agriculture is far below what it should be and we intend to make use of the county agent and leading farmers in each district in order that our country boys and girls may really learn something new and practical about farming every week they attend school. We feel that the movement of boys and girls from the country to the city is a serious blow, not only to agricultural interests but to the country at large. The schools must do their part to keep the boys and girls on the farm. Clubwork will create an interest in the farm because the boy and girl who owns a calf, a pig or an acre or two of corn looks at farm life differently than the boy or girl who work from day to day and see no returns.

We have tried to maintain the office at almost no increase in the expense over what it was two and three years ago. This has been very difficult because prices of some of the necessities for the office have increased three times. In order to keep down the expense of the office we have mimeographed certain form papers instead of having them printed. We did not print programs for the School Board and Teachers' Convention. Forms such as contract blanks, notices for meetings, statements of standings, enrollment blanks, etc., are mimeographed instead of printed as formerly. Mimeographing of contracts alone saved about fifteen dollars. We mention this because we want you to know why we send out mimeographed forms instead of printed ones. We have tried to save postage by delivering pamphlets, law books, etc., when we visit schools. If we had not pursued such a policy we would have found it necessary to go far beyond the budget. We assure you that we shall continue this policy of economy. We will not, however, sacri-

face the welfare of the precious boys and girls in our schools. We will endeavor to make the most of the funds at our disposal.

We have found the people of Portage county interested in the welfare of the schools and they have been willing and ready to improve the buildings and secure the necessary equipment whenever it has been brought to their attention that the welfare of their children has been at stake.

Thanking you for your co-operation thus far and trusting that we may long enjoy that spirit in the interests of our schools, I am

#### RESOLUTION NO.

##### Providing for Federal and County Aid Construction

The county board of supervisors of Portage county, regularly assembled, does hereby ordain and resolve, that Portage county, Wisconsin raise the following sums for the original improvement of the following described portions of the County System of Propective State Highways in said county, to-wit:

WHEREAS, the State Highway commission has notified the county clerk that the sum of one hundred twenty thousand dollars (\$120,000), of which this county must provide the sum of forty thousand dollars (\$40,000), will be expended in 1921 or as soon as possible thereafter under sections 1314, 1315 and 1316 of the statutes for federal and state aid construction on a project beginning about 1500 feet southeast of the north limits of Stevens Point on the Stevens Point-Junction City road and extending along state trunk highway No. 18 in a north-westerly direction as far as the funds available will construct, this determination is hereby approved and the sum of twenty thousand dollars is hereby appropriated to pay the cost of the county's share of said construction. Twenty thousand dollars

(\$20,000) was appropriated in 1920, making a total of forty thousand dollars (\$40,000) available by the county.

WHEREAS, the state highway commission has notified the county clerk that the sum of one hundred twenty-seven thousand nine hundred seventy-six dollars and seventy-one cents (\$127,976.71), of which this county must provide the sum of forty-three thousand four hundred seventeen dollars and fifteen cents (\$43,417.15), will be expended in 1921 or as soon as possible thereafter under the provisions of sections 1314, 1315 and 1316 of the statutes for federal and state aid construction on a project beginning at the south construction limits in the city of Stevens Point and extending along state-trunk highway No. 10 in a southerly direction known as the Stevens Point-Plover road, as far as the funds available will construct. This determination is hereby approved and the sum of forty-three thousand four hundred seventeen dollars and fifteen cents (\$43,417.15), is hereby appropriated to pay the county's share of the cost of said construction.

WHEREAS, the federal and state aid funds are not sufficient to complete the Stevens Point-Plover road to Plover, there is hereby appropriated the sum of forty-eight thousand five hundred eighty-two dollars and eighty-five cents (\$48,582.85) to complete the above mentioned road to Plover or as far as the funds available will construct.

For the improvement by grading and surfacing state trunk highway No. 18, locally known as the Stevens Point-Waupaca road commencing approximately one-eighth of a mile south of the northeast corner of section 5, T23, R8E and extending thence in a southerly direction as far as the funds available will construct, the sum of twenty thousand dollars (\$20,000).

That for the purpose of raising said sums, the said county shall issue its series A, non-taxable, semi-annual interest payment coupon bonds, as provided in sections 1317m-12 and 1317m-12a of the statutes in a form approved by the state highway commission, in the aggregate amounting to one hundred thirty-two thousand dollars (\$132,000.00) and bearing interest at the rate of five per cent (5%) per annum, payable semi-annually on the first day of April and the first day of October of each year. The principal and interest of said bonds shall be payable at the office of the county treasurer of the said county.

Said bonds shall be two hundred sixty-four in number (264), numbered from one to two hundred sixty-four inclusive; they shall all be of the denomination of five hundred dollars (\$500.00); they shall all bear date of April 1st, 1921, and shall mature and become due as follows; to wit:

Bonds numbered 1 to 80 inclusive, April 1st, 1921.

Bonds numbered 81 to 264 inclusive, April 1st, 1922.

Under the provisions of section 1317m-12 (4) of the statutes the county board may provide that a sum not to exceed forty (40) per centum of the county's share of the cost of construction may be assessed as a special benefit against any town, village or city in which such construction is contemplated.

It is further resolved that there be and is hereby assessed as a special benefit against the following subdivisions of this county the sums set opposite their names, respectively:

Town, City or Village	Amount Assessed

Plover, town	8,000.00

Plover, village ..... 2,500.00  
 Stockton, town ..... 3,000.00  
 Amherst, town ..... 1,000.00

And the amount of each such special benefit is hereby levied as a special charge against the above named subdivisions of the county, and the county clerk is hereby directed to certify such sum to the clerks of said subdivisions of the county who shall put the same in the next tax levy.

But in case the amount of such special charge shall produce a tax upon any such subdivisions of the county in excess of one-half mill upon its local equalized valuation, then an amount equal to a one-half mill tax upon said valuation shall be certified annually by the county clerk to the clerk of the said subdivision of the county until the total special charge shall have been certified.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that the chairman of the county board, county clerk and the county road and bridge committee are hereby directed to negotiate the sale of the above mentioned bonds, or any portion thereof, not exceeding in all the sum of one hundred thirty-two thousand dollars (\$132,000.00), at such time or times as the necessity for providing funds for construction arises.

BE IT RESOLVED, that the county clerk be and is hereby directed to annually certify as other county taxes are certified, to the clerks of all the taxing districts in Portage county the necessary amount of taxes needed to pay the interest and principal of such bonds as the same fall due.

BE IT FURTHER ORDERED, that section 4225a of the statutes of Wisconsin shall apply to the bond issue hereinbefore ordered and to each and every issue of bonds by this county; and the county clerk shall submit said bonds and a certified copy of the proceedings preliminary to the issue thereof to the bond commission of Wisconsin for its examination and certificate of validity.

#### RESOLUTION

#### Providing for Federal, State and County Aid Construction and Maintenance in the Calendar Year 1921

The county board of supervisors of Portage county regularly assembled, does hereby ordain as follows:

Sec. 1. WHEREAS, the state highway commission has notified the county clerk that the sum of six thousand two hundred thirty-five dollars and forty-six cents (\$6,235.46) has been allotted to this county under sections 1317m-1 to 1317m-15, inclusive, of the statutes, (the state aid law); and

WHEREAS, Section 1317m-5 requires that 50 per cent of the foregoing sum amounting to three thousand one hundred seventeen dollars and seventy-three cents (\$3117.73) together with at least one and one-half times this amount of county funds

must be expended on the state trunk highway system lying within the county;

There is hereby appropriated, under the provisions of sections 1317m-1 to 1317m-15, inclusive, the sum of sixteen thousand eight hundred and eighty-two dollars and twenty-seven cents (\$16882.17), to meet the first 50 per cent of the state aid allotment to be placed on the state trunk highway system, this making available for this purpose the sum of twenty thousand dollars (\$20,000.00), which shall be expended as follows:

The sum of six thousand dollars (\$6000.00) for the improvement by grading and surfacing of state trunk highway No. 73, beginning at southwest corner section 31, T21, R7E, and extending easterly as far as the money available will construct.

The sum of six thousand dollars (\$6,000.00) for the improvement by grading and surfacing of state trunk highway No. 18, beginning at Plover river bridge and extending easterly as far as the money available will construct.

The sum of eight thousand dollars (\$8,000.00) for the improvement by grading and surfacing of state trunk highway No. 66, beginning at end of 1919 work and extending westerly as far as the money available will construct.

Sec. 2. And in accordance with section 1317m-5, statutes, the second fifty per cent portion of the state aid allotted to this county, amounting to three thousand one hundred seventeen dollars and seventy-three cents (\$3117.73), hereinbefore undistributed, is appropriated for the improvements hereinafter named, county appropriations are made for each improvement, and taxes are levied against the municipalities in which such improvements lie, in accordance with the following schedule:

And the improvements to be made under the foregoing schedule are hereby located on portions of the county system of prospective state highways not portions of the state trunk highway system, and their character determined as follows:

The improvement in the town of Belmont shall consist of grading and surfacing beginning one-quarter mile east of center section 27, T21, R10E, Almond-Heffron road and extending along said system in a southerly direction.

The improvement in the town of Lanark shall consist of grading and surfacing beginning end of 1918 work Amherst and Almond road and extending along said system in a southerly direction.

The improvement in the town of Linwood shall consist of grading and surfacing beginning south end of 1920 work on state road and extending along said system in a southerly direction.

The improvement in the town of New Hope shall consist of grading and surfacing beginning southeast corner section 36, Amherst Junction-Iola road and extending along said system in a westerly direction.

Sec. 3. WHEREAS, the various towns hereinafter named have filed petitions for county aid on improvements to be executed under the provisions of section 1317m-4, statutes, said petitions are hereby granted and county appropriations made in

accordance with the following schedule, and improvements to be located by the state aid road and bridge committee and the town and village boards.

1. In the town of Alban the sum of two thousand dollars (\$2000.00) for the improvement by grading and surfacing, beginning at north end of 1920 work and extending north on the Alban-Peru road.

2. Town of Almond the sum of two thousand dollars (\$2000) for the improvement by grading and surfacing beginning at east end of clay road and continuing easterly.

3. Town of Amherst the sum of two thousand dollars (\$2000) for the improvement by grading and surfacing: First, the unimproved pieces on the Amherst-Lanark road; second, by grading and surfacing the Amherst Junction-Iola trunk line road on town line between T23-24, beginning at one quarter line section 4, T23-10 and extending easterly as far as funds available will construct, together with any fund that can be transferred by town board and state aid road and bridge committee belonging to town of Amherst.

4. Town of Eau Pleine the sum of one thousand dollars (\$1000) for the improvement by grading and surfacing, beginning at town hall of Eau Pleine on 73 and extending northerly.

5. Town of Grant the sum of one thousand dollars (\$1000) for the improvement by grading and surfacing, beginning at the north end of 1920 work and extending northerly on the Meehan road.

6. Town of Buena Vista the sum of thirty-two hundred dollars \$3200) for the improvement by grading, beginning at west end of 1920 work and extending westerly on Pleasant Valley road.

7. Town of Sharon the sum of two thousand dollars (\$2000) for the improvement by grading and surfacing on the Custer-Polonia Road beginning on the line between Sharon and Stockton and extending northerly.

8. Village of Almond the sum of two thousand dollars (\$2000) for the improvement to be determined by the village board and the road and bridge committee.

Sec. 5. The said county board does hereby appropriate the following sums to be provided by a general county tax levy for the purposes set forth.

1. For the county's share of the cost of state aid improvements on the state trunk highway system provided for in section 2 of this resolution the sum of twelve thousand eighty-two dollars and twenty-three cents (\$12082.23).

2. For the county's share of the cost of improvements on portions of the county system of prospective state highways

not portions of the state trunk highway system, as set forth in section 3 of this resolution the sum of forty-five hundred dollars (\$4500.00).

4. For the maintenance of the county system of prospective state highways (or county trunk highway system, or both) in addition to sums received under section 20.04 (3) (a) the sum of one thousand dollars (\$1000.00).

5. For emergency road and bridge fund the sum of nine thousand (\$9000.00).

6. For the purchase of machinery and machinery repairs the sum of three thousand dollars (\$3000.00).

7. For the purchase of county gravel pits and stone quarries the sum of one thousand dollars (\$1000.00).

It is greatly to be regretted that the annual report of the Portage county traveling library board for 1919 failed to reach the board of supervisors at the 1919 meeting, and that no appropriation was made to continue the work. The members of the traveling library board believe that the people of Portage county desire to continue the traveling library system in order that they may have good books freely distributed throughout the county.

There is a movement among the fifteen counties in this state having the county traveling library system to make a change in its administration. Miss Julia Wright Merrill, member of the county library committee of the Wisconsin Library association, came to Stevens Point Sept. 20, 1920, to interest the Stevens Point Public library board as well as the county traveling library board in the proposed change. Miss Merrill called a meeting at Amherst on Sept. 20th and explained the plan to some twenty representative ladies; the week following a group of business men and others took up the plan favorably.

The Stevens Point Public library favored the new plan, and the Milwaukee and Antigo Public libraries are now operating under it.

It is expected that Mr. C. B. Lester, secretary of the Wisconsin Free Library commission, will address the board of supervisors and explain the proposed change which may be roughly outlined as follows:

The law of 1897 provides that any library board may contract with the board of supervisors of a county to loan books singly or in traveling libraries to its inhabitants for a proper consideration. In return for this service, the county may make an appropriation to a public library which undertakes this extension work. See Wisconsin statutes 1917, section 43, paragraph 31 as amended by laws of 1919.—ch. 531.

The Stevens Point librarians report many of the county teachers drawing books for their pupils and themselves, to read for the state reading circle. The county people are borrowing more and more books from the Stevens Point public library, and if the library is to maintain this service to non-residents, the county must vote a sufficient appropriation as its share. In return the county readers have the services of a trained librarian, a larger selection of books to choose from, and books sent them in response to a telephone call or a postal.

If the new plan is adopted as proposed by the Wisconsin Free Library commission, the traveling library board will go out of existence, and the books which number some 1700 volumes will be turned over to the Stevens Point Public library where good use will be made of them.

In case the board of supervisors prefer to retain the system now in operation the members of the traveling library board respectfully petition the Honorable Board of Supervisors of Portage county for five hundred dollars (\$500.00) (\$200.00 of this amount being what we should have had last year) and \$300.00 for this year as the price of books has nearly doubled that of last year.

Each and every member of the board of supervisors is invited to visit the city library, and to confer with the librarian on what books they would like in their community, and to inform themselves about the chests of books which will be fur-

nished to any person in the county who applies and calls for them.

Gentlemen: In presenting my ninth annual report to your Honorable body, I wish to say: The work in 1920 has been as satisfactory as could be expected under the condition existing, help has been hard to secure, but the assistance given by the chairmen of the various localities where we have had work in securing local men and teams to help out on the work was of great help and was appreciated.

We have built during the season 17¼ miles of 15 foot gravel road, 7¾ miles of 9 foot gravel road, also surfaced with gravel about 6 miles of old road, besides grading 6 miles of road, have built the new Jordan bridge, at a cost as shown in the report, have also built a 10 foot concrete culvert on the Almond-Waupaca road, and have expended about \$28,000.00 on federal road maintenance.

Mr. G. Germond of the Wisconsin Highway commission explained to the board the new town road law.

Clerk read the report of the county farm committee as follows:

To the Honorable Chairman and Members of the County Board of Supervisors of Portage county, Wisconsin:

Gentlemen: We, your committee on county farm, would respectfully report to your honorable body as follows: On the morning of Feb. 21st at about 9 o'clock fire was discovered in the attic of the poor house by the superintendent. The fire, which is believed started from the electric wiring, had gained such headway that all that could be done was to get the inmates out and save a few articles. The building was completely burned except the walls which were left standing. The inmates were placed in different homes and in the village hall at Amherst Junction. There were three county charges, two from Amherst Junction, one from Carson, two from Dewey, two from Eau Pleine, one from Plover town, one from Stockton, and four from the city of Stevens Point.

Your committee notified the city of Stevens Point and the

several towns and villages who had charges at the farm to take care of them, which has been done.

The committee has made arrangements for the temporary care of the three county inmates.

The county carried insurance on the building of \$7,000 and the contents \$800. We had the county clerk notify the several insurance companies of the loss. The proofs have been furnished the companies and the insurance is now being settled for in full.

We had the old house which had been used as a store house cleaned up and a one story addition, 16x26, built on the west side for a dining room and a bed room, leaving a kitchen, one bed room and a pantry on the lower floor. On the second floor there are three bed rooms which have been covered with wall board and repaired the whole cost to be about \$600.

We secured the services of C. H. Packard of the city of Stevens Point to look over the premises that were burned and to make an estimate on rebuilding the building.

His estimate is as follows:

**RULES OF THE BOARD**

Rules adopted by the Board of Supervisors of Portage County at the November Session 1920

- Rule 1. The hour for daily meeting of this board shall be at 9 o'clock a. m. unless otherwise ordered.
- Rule 2. The chairman shall take the chair at the time to which the board stands adjourned, and the board shall then be called to order, and the roll of members called.
- Rule 3. Upon the appearance of a quorum, the journal of the preceding day shall be read by the clerk, and any mistakes therein may be corrected by the board; provided that upon the last day of the session the journal for that day shall be read by the clerk, and before the final adjournment corrected by the board.
- Rule 4. The chair shall preserve order, and shall decide questions of order, subject to an appeal of the board.
- Rule 5. The chairman shall vote on all questions taken by yeas and nays, except on appeal from his own decisions.
- Rule 6. Every member, previous to his speaking, shall arise and address himself to the chair.
- Rule 7. When two or more members rise at once, the chair shall designate the member who is first to speak. But in all cases, the members who shall first rise and address the chair, shall speak first.
- Rule 8. No motion shall be debated or put unless the same be seconded. It shall be stated by the chairman before debate; and any such motion shall be reduced to writing if any member desires it.
- Rule 9. Every written resolution or motion shall have prefixed thereto the name of the person introducing it. And when ordered by a committee the names of said committee shall be endorsed thereon.
- Rule 10. A vote on any question shall be taken by the yeas and nays when called for by any member of the board.
- Rule 11. No rule of the board shall be suspended, altered or amended without the concurrence of two-thirds of the members present.
- Rule 12. On the meeting of the board after the reading and the correcting of the journal of the preceding day, the order of business shall be as follows: 1st. Reception of petitions, memorials, etc. 2d. Resolutions may be offered and considered. 3d. Reports of committees and consideration thereof. 4th. Consideration of miscellaneous business on the table.
- Rule 13. No account or claim against the county shall be audited unless it be made out in items, and duly verified, and be filed with the clerk of the board in the manner prescribed by law, except as provided by Chapter 153, General Laws of 1868, unless by consent of two-thirds of the members present.
- Rule 14. As amended November, 1898: All resolutions appropriating money shall be voted upon by yeas and nays, and shall not be acted upon until the next day after presentation, without the consent of the majority of the members elected.
- Rule 15. It shall be the duty of the chairmen of all committees to report work completed, or progress of work, upon the call of committee according to Rule 12.
