Meeting No. 1

Stevens Point Wis., March 30, 1921, 10 o'clock a. m.

Special meeting called to order by Hon. G. L. Park, Chairman.

The Chairman announced that the meeting was called by him under the authority given him by the resolution passed by the County Board at the annual meeting in 1920. Clerk read the following call:

Stevens Point, Wis., March 23, 1921.

To the Honorable Chairman:

There will be a special meeting of the County Board of Portage county on March 30, 1921, at 10 o'clock a. m. at the court house in the city of Stevens Point as per resolution passed by the County Board at the annual session in 1920. The matter of building a county house and such other business as may come up will be taken up at this time.

G. L. Park, Chairman  
Supervisor Mersch, chairman of the County Farm commit-

tee, submitted several different plans of county buildings but the cost of all were too high. He also exhibited some plans drawn up here of a fire proof building estimated to cost when completed about \$36,000.

Clerk reported that a deed for the County Farm had been sent to the First National Bank at Minneapolis on January 12, 1921 and in reply to a telegram sent to the Railroad company regarding the same the following communication was received: Minneapolis, St. Paul & Sault Ste. Marie Ry. Co.

Hon. A. E. Bourn, Portage County Clerk,  
Stevens Point, Wisconsin.

Dear Mr. Bourn: In answer to your wire "County Board meets Wednesday wire me when we will get check for part of County Farm" which was also received by Superintendent Urbahn. In answer I wired you "Would like option of paying ten thousand cash and balance in one year at five per cent writing."

It is probably needless to explain why we ask that the County Board consent to my proposition, as they have all no doubt read of the "tightness of the money situation" particularly with the railroads. The Federal Government owes us a large sum and our expenses have been exceedingly heavy since the roads were turned back to the corporation, after government operation.

In view of the fact that we were required to buy approximately 135 acres in excess of what we wished for gravel purposes it does not seem to me that my request is unreasonable. Will you kindly wire me collect whether we may have the privilege of handling the matter in that way, that is to pay \$10,000 cash and the balance secured by a mortgage back on the premises at five per cent, running for one year. If this would be acceptable, I can have the funds sent in care of a bank there for closing in that manner, tomorrow evening or at the latest Wednesday evening, to reach you Thursday morning.

BE IT RESOLVED, by the county board of supervisors of Portage county, Wisconsin, in special meeting assembled,

That the \$40,000 placed in the 1920 tax levy to take care of highway bond issue for bonds numbered One to Eighty inclusive due April 1, 1921, be authorized to be destroyed by the Chairman and the Clerk of this board with the County State Road and Bridge committee and the funds so raised by said tax levy be used for the purpose for which the bond issue was provided.

Moved by Supervisor Wolfe the resolution be adopted. Motion carried.

Moved by Supervisor Halverson that the board adjourn until 1:30 p. m. Motion carried.

Moved by Supervisor Stertz that no money be appropriated by the county for a county nurse. Motion carried.

Moved by Supervisor Halverson that Portage county build a house at the county farm. Motion carried.

Moved by Supervisor Wolfe that the county build a house this year. Motion carried by 25 ayes and 3 nays. The following voted aye: Supervisors Betker, Martin, Skoglund, Wilson, Starks, Loftis, Worzella, Cychoz, Wolfe, Timm, Laszewski, Stertz, Hammon, Pascavis, Halverson, Diver, Parks, Halladay, Gilbert, Burant, F. Lukasavitz, Mansur, P. Lukasavitz, Mersch, Aldrich. Nays: Supervisors Sawyer, Park, Atwell.

Moved by Supervisor Halladay that the plans exhibited here by Supervisor Mersch be accepted as prospective plans for the county house. Motion carried.

Moved by Supervisor Wolfe that the selection of a site for the county farm building be left to the County Farm committee, County Clerk and Chairman of the County Board. Motion carried.

Moved by Supervisor Sawyer that the committee be authorized to have an architect draw plans and specifications according to the tentative plans submitted to the board and submit the same to the state for their approval and when approved advertise for bids. Motion carried.

Moved by Supervisor Parks that after the plans and specifications for the county house are approved and the committee advertised for three weeks for bids and on the date of the return of the bids the Chairman be authorized to call a special meeting of the County Board. That no bids be accepted unless a certified check of 5 per cent of the cost of the building accompany the bid and the County Board reserves the right to reject any and all bids. Motion carried.

Moved by Supervisor Atwell that the building and grounds

committee be instructed to have a single line telephone installed at the jail. Motion carried.

Moved by Supervisor Halverson, that the county board accept the proposal of the Wisconsin Central Land company made by wire to this board this afternoon to close up the deal for that part of the Portage county farm described in the deed now deposited with the First National Bank at Minneapolis, Minnesota, by paying Seventeen Thousand Five Hundred (\$17,500) Dollars in cash and to give Portage county a mortgage for Seventeen Thousand Five Hundred (\$17,500) Dollars back on the property as described in said deed payable in one year without interest, that Portage county have the use of the said lands described in said deed for the year 1921, except a strip on the north side of the Soo line right of way to be used by the said Soo line to remove gravel, also that the said Portage county have until June 1st, 1922, to remove the buildings from the said lands, that these new proposals be added to the deed and that the said Wisconsin Central Land company close up the deal by depositing the said amount of Seventeen Thousand Five Hundred Dollars in the First National Bank at Minneapolis, Minnesota, within five days from this date. As a result of these investigations they find the following: (1) That many destitute and deserving families of children received no aid at all because of the inadequacy of the appropriation of \$1,000. (2) That other counties of Wisconsin having approximately the same population as Portage County appropriated an average of \$5,312 in 1919. Therefore the Portage County League of Women Voters and the Woman's Club of Stevens Point respectfully ask that this Board of Supervisors appropriate \$4,000 to be administered under the "Mothers' Pension" law in the help of deserving children and their mothers in our county.

Home life is the highest and finest product of civilization. It is the great moulding force of mind and character. Children should not be deprived of it except for urgent and compelling reasons. Children of parents of worthy character, suffering from temporary misfortune, and children of reasonably efficient and deserving mothers who are without the support of the normal breadwinner should as a rule be kept with their parents, such aid being given as may be necessary to maintain suitable homes for the rearing of children. Except in unusual circumstances, the home should not be broken up for reasons of poverty but only for consideration of inefficiency or immorality.

Clerk read the following resolution providing for federal state and county aid construction:

Resolution providing for federal, state, and county aid construction and maintenance in the calendar year 1921.

The county board of supervisors of Portage county regularly assembled, does hereby ordain as follows:

Sec. 1 Whereas, the state highway commission has notified the county clerk that the sum of six thousand, two hundred nine dollars and sixty-six cents (\$6,209.66) has been allotted to this county under Section 1317m-1 to 1317m-15, inclusive of the states, (the state aid law); and

Whereas, Section 1317m-5 requires that 50 per cent of the foregoing sum amounting to three thousand, one hundred four dollars and eighty-three cents (3,104.83) together with at least one and one-half times this amount of county funds must be expended on the state trunk highway system lying within the county;

There is hereby appropriated, under the provisions of sections 1317m-1 to 1317m-15 inclusive, the sum of four thousand six hundred fifty-seven dollars and twenty-five cents (\$4,657.25), to meet the first 50 per cent of the state aid allotment to be placed on the state trunk highway system, this making available for this purpose the sum of seven thousand, seven hundred sixty-two dollars and eight cents (\$7,762.08) which shall be expended as follows:

The sum of one thousand one hundred eighty-six dollars and eighty-three cents (\$1,186.83) emergency fund for rebuilding bridge floors.

The sum of two thousand five hundred dollars (\$2,500) for the improvement by grading and surfacing of state trunk highway No. 73, beginning at end of 1921 construction and extending easterly as far as the money available will construct.

The sum of four thousand seventy-five dollars and twenty-five cents (\$4,075.25) for the improvement by grading and surfacing of state trunk highway No. 66, beginning at the north county line and extending southerly as far as the money available will construct.

Section II. And in accordance with section 1317m-5, statutes the second fifty per cent portion of the state aid allotted to this county, amounting to three thousand one hundred four dollars and eighty-three cents (\$3,104.83), hereinbefore undistributed, is appropriated for the improvements hereinafter named, county appropriations are made for each improvement, and taxes are levied against the municipalities in which such improvements lie, in accordance with the following schedule:

The improvement in the town of Lanark shall consist of grading and surfacing beginning end of 1921 work, Amherst-Almond road and extending along said system in a southerly direction.

The improvement in the town of Belmont shall consist of grading and surfacing beginning end of 1919 work on Almond-Amherst road and extending along said system in a northerly direction.

Following is the report of Alice M. Gordon, County Superintendent of Schools.

To the Honorable County Board of Supervisors of Portage County, Wis.

Mr. Chairman and Gentlemen: I have the pleasure of submitting for your consideration a report of the work done in the interest of Portage county schools since receiving the appointment of County Superintendent of Portage county, January 8, 1921.

There were 151 teachers in Portage county during 1920-1921, teaching 124 schools. Four year high schools are maintained in the villages of Amherst and Almond. Graded schools of the first class are maintained in Bancroft, Junction City and Rosholt. Graded schools of the second class are maintained at Amherst Junction, Custer and Nelsonville. During the year 1921-1922, Custer decided to maintain a one-room school and Plover a two room rural school.

There was a total of 116 rural schools in the county employing 116 rural teachers, outside of the city of Stevens Point. No school was maintained in Dewey, district 4, neither did they transport to another school.

There was an increase of teachers' salaries in Portage county during 1920-1921. In spite of this, there was a shortage of legally qualified teachers in the county, and special licenses were granted to thirteen people who passed a satisfactory examination conducted by the county superintendent with the permission of the state superintendent. This meant that about 1-10 of our rural schools were taught by people without training in the profession of teaching.

This is to be regretted, as the problem of the rural teacher is by far the greatest problem in the teaching profession. Through strenuous efforts and with the assistance of school boards we have been able to supply the schools of Portage county with legally qualified teachers, so there are no teachers in Portage county with special third grades. We are fortunate in this respect as there were about 34 counties which could not secure enough legally qualified teachers to fill their schools.

Almond Dist. 7 has closed its school and transported its pupils to the village school in Almond. They had a small enrollment and at the present prices this is a very advisable thing to do. A district closing its own school and transporting to an adjoining district, pays tuition, gets state aid in transportation and at the same time secures the customary state aid. There are a number of other schools in Portage county where this procedure would have been advisable. These schools are maintaining school for 6 or 8 pupils. Especially is this advisable when school buildings have been condemned, the district may take advantage of transportation and still obtain their state aid. A new law regarding the tuition paid in a rural district was passed at the last meeting of the state legislature. In computing the rate of tuition, divide the total salary of the teacher by the number of pupils enrolled. Divide by the number of school months to get the monthly rate.

Four schools were condemned in this county three and four years ago, namely Hull 5, Stockton 14, Carson 4, Buena Vista 3 and Belmont 7 this last year. The time for building was extended in each of these instances, but this last year none of them received state aid. Carson 4 is erecting a modern new building, but as yet the other districts have not taken any action.

The Committee on Common Schools composed of Lyman Precourt, Martin Heffron and John Marchel appointed Miss Lucille Berard and Miss Regina Somers as supervising teachers. During 1920 and 1921 Miss Lucille Berard made 194 visits, visiting 40 schools once, 41 schools twice, 14 schools three times and 8 schools four times.

A "school" has always been interpreted to mean the following, and was defined by the 1921 legislature in Chapter 168: "Unless the context or subject matter clearly requires otherwise, the word 'school' when used as a noun shall relate to a public school and shall be construed to be a collective body of pupils assembled in a room or rooms which are wholly or principally under the control, management, direction and instruction of a legally qualified teacher who is wholly or chiefly responsible for the control, management, direction and instruction of such pupils and whose duty it is to keep a complete and special register for his room or his department."

Portage county has 143 such teachers responsible for the management, control and instruction of a collective body or pupils, who keep special registers. This means Portage county has 143 teachers in 125 buildings.

Miss Regina Somers made 236 visits, visiting 35 schools once, 32 schools twice, 18 schools three times, 9 four times and 3 schools five times.

I visited 120 teachers after taking charge of the office and attended 40 community meetings.

Four thousand seven hundred eighty-three pieces of mail

were sent out of the office and 3,545 received. 2,298 visits were made to the office.

Teachers' examinations have been conducted as usual. Diploma examinations for rural schools were conducted at Stevens Point, Lanark, Nelsonville, Junction City, Rosholt, Kellner, Almond, Bancroft and Amherst. Diploma examinations for graded schools were conducted at Junction City, Bancroft, Rosholt, Amherst Junction and Custer. The Board of Examiners who conducted examinations and corrected papers was composed of Principal Jones, Principal Feist, Principal Gilson, Prin. Irene Morrow, Prin. Agnes Tufte, Marie Russell, Jessie Finnessy, Gustave Olson, Nellie Taylor and the supervising teachers and myself. Diplomas were granted to 189 pupils.

County graduation exercises were held at Stevens Point with a large attendance. A program was given by rural people and President Sims and Professor Neale gave addresses. Almost every graduate was there to receive his diploma.

The annual joint school board convention and teachers' convention was held at Stevens Point October 27, 1920. A. A. Thompson, rural school supervisor, represented the state department.

Sectional teachers' meetings were held at Almond, Amherst, Junction City and Rosholt with the assistance of Miss Hansen and Miss Clark of the Normal School Training department assisting. This year a two days' institute was held at Stevens Point and almost every teacher in the county attended this meeting. The Training Department of the Normal school gave us actual teaching which gives the teachers an opportunity to carry out in their own schools the actual things they saw.

An educational exhibit was made at the county fair. Here were gathered specimens of work from various parts of the county. It is hoped that Portage county may be represented at the State Fair next year with an educational booth.

Last fall November 14-20 was Good School Week and this year November 7 to 11 was set aside as Good School Week. Programs were held in various centers in the county, where practically all schools in the county were represented. We are fortunate in securing members of the Stevens Point Normal school faculty as speakers at these meetings. Miss Martha Riley was with us during this week, putting on a health campaign. A very commendable spirit was shown at these meetings. School patrons and school board members gave talks and the numbers given were excellent because they were selected from the daily school work.

The total number of books added to the school libraries was 1,071 at a cost of \$867.14. The total number of books now in the school libraries is valued at \$19,804.90. A new law passed by the last state legislature provides 20 cents per capita for the library fund instead of 10 cents formerly provided.

Teachers' and young peoples' reading circles were continued this year and the report shows the following:

This is a valuable part of school instruction, as it is mainly through reading that we get enjoyment and information later in life. The habit of reading should be acquired by every child in the county.

This year school societies will be conducted in every school in the county. Parliamentary law is practiced so pupils when they grow up can conduct business meetings legally. The president of the society during Good School Week took charge of public meetings, giving them valuable training in good citizenship.

Gentlemen: Be it ordained by the Board of Supervisors of Portage county, Wisconsin, that A. E. Bourn, County Clerk of said county, be and hereby is, appointed as purchasing agent for said county, for the ensuing year and that the sum of \$3,000 is hereby appropriated and placed at his disposal to draw upon as purchasing fund and that all books, stationery and supplies necessary to be purchased for the ensuing year be purchased by said agent, and also for paying for electric lights, gas and water for the court house and jail, and that the chairman and county clerk are authorized to draw orders on the county treasurer in payment therefor, said agent to report his expenditures of said fund at the next annual meeting of the county board.

Clerk read the following resolution:

Whereas, under the present law state trunk highway construction is now financed by three units, the federal government, the state and the counties each paying one-third, the state's one-third being raised by a general property tax and the counties being required to raise an equal amount locally by a general property tax;

Whereas, we believe that the loading of the state's share of this fund on a general property tax and especially the requirement that the counties shall raise an equal amount by a general property tax is unjust and has become a burden to many counties in the state;

Whereas, we are thorough believers in good roads but believe that the burden of construction and maintaining these roads should be borne by those most benefitted, the owners of automobiles and trucks. Today the 60,000 miles of town highways are built and maintained by a general property tax. We believe that the burden of the construction and maintenance of the 7,500 miles of state trunk highways and the 7,500 miles of county trunk highways should, instead of being put on the shoulders of the general property taxpayer, be placed on motor vehicles. The motor vehicle has created the demand for good roads and is getting the benefit from them and hence the owner should pay a larger part of the bill.

Whereas, at present no less than 20 per cent of the motor vehicles registered each year are not assessed for local tax purposes and it is a conservative estimate that thirty per cent offset their personal property tax against their income tax and pay no personal property tax on their automobiles. Practically every farmer pays a personal property tax;

Therefore, Be it Resolved, by the County Board of Portage County that this board go on record as favoring a law along the lines of the highway appropriation bill known as 465-S which was defeated in the closing days of the last session of the legislature. We realize that there were some features of this bill which could be eliminated without injury to the cause, but feel that in the main the bill was along the right lines and would have relieved the direct property taxation for road purposes and would have placed the burden of taxes for road improvement upon those benefitted where it justly belongs.

Be It Further Resolved, that a copy of these resolutions be forwarded to the governor of Wisconsin and he to call a special session and enact a law along the line as above mentioned, and to the representatives of this county in the state legislature.

### RULES OF THE BOARD

Rules adopted by the Board of Supervisors of Portage County at the November Session 1921

- Rule 1. The hour for daily meeting of this board shall be at 9 o'clock a. m. unless otherwise ordered.
- Rule 2. The chairman shall take the chair at the time to which the board stands adjourned, and the board shall then be called to order, and the roll of members called.
- Rule 3. Upon the appearance of a quorum, the journal of the preceding day shall be read by the clerk, and any mistakes therein may be corrected by the board; provided that upon the last day of the session the journal for that day shall be read by the clerk, and before the final adjournment corrected by the board.
- Rule 4. The chair shall preserve order, and shall decide questions of order, subject to an appeal of the board.
- Rule 5. The chairman shall vote on all questions taken by yeas and nays, except on appeal from his own decisions.
- Rule 6. Every member, previous to his speaking, shall arise and address himself to the chair.
- Rule 7. When two or more members rise at once, the chair shall designate the member who is first to speak. But in all cases, the members who shall first rise and address the chair, shall speak first.
- Rule 8. No motion shall be debated or put unless the same be seconded. It shall be stated by the chairman before debate; and any such motion shall be reduced to writing if any member desires it.
- Rule 9. Every written resolution or motion shall have prefixed thereto the name of the person introducing it. And when ordered by a committee the names of said committee shall be endorsed thereon.
- Rule 10. A vote on any question shall be taken by the yeas and nays when called for by any member of the board.
- Rule 11. No rule of the board shall be suspended, altered or amended without the concurrence of two-thirds of the members present.
- Rule 12. On the meeting of the board after the reading and the correcting of the journal of the preceding day, the order of business shall be as follows: 1st. Reception of petitions, memorials, etc. 2d. Reso-

lutions may be offered and considered. 3d. Reports of committees and consideration thereof. 4th. Consideration of miscellaneous business on the table.

- Rule 13. No account or claim against the county shall be audited unless it be made out in items, and duly verified, and be filed with the clerk of the board in the manner prescribed by law, except as provided by Chapter 153, General Laws of 1868, unless by consent of two-thirds of the members present.
- Rule 14. As amended November, 1898: All resolutions appropriating money shall be voted upon by yeas and nays, and shall not be acted upon until the next day after presentation, without the consent of the majority of the members elected.
- Rule 15. It shall be the duty of the chairmen of all committees to report work completed, or progress of work, upon the call of committee according to Rule 12.
